About six months after the funeral I was surprised to receive a note from V.'s widow asking me to call. After an absence of about two years I found that nothing had changed. Evidently there would be no sale until after Mrs. V.'s demise. Her manner was warmer than before and after the usual greetings and enquiries she led me into the study where V. had kept the coin cabinets. There she offered me a glass of sherry from the cut-glass decanter. As I sipped it I wondered if it had been disturbed apart from dusting since V.'s death.

"You must be wondering," said Mrs. V. "why I suggested you should call, but V. used to enjoy your visits so much, I thought you might like something to remember him by".

At this sentence my heart gave a bound, perhaps Mrs. V. would offer me an item from the Cromwell cabinet, and if she did, what would I dare suggest? I knew exactly what I wanted most, the excessively rare fifty shilling piece, but that was gold, and was ruled out as altogether too valuable. It would have to be the half-crown of 1656, which a dealer would have described as VF/EF - Yes I sighed to myself, it would have to be the halferrown.

Mrs. V. turned toward the cabinet, and then she took a cigar box which stood to one side. She placed it in my hands. "There", she said, "I'm sure my husband would have been glad for you to have this little souvenir of your meetings".

I bowed, and was dismissed as kindly as I had been greeted. Perhaps... I thought, but I was wrong. The box was half full of very, very dry cigars, and there was no little surprise of any kind concealed beneath them. Collectors become steeled against mischances, and they soon forget them in the delight of bargain or discovery, but somehow, when I now think of V., it is old tobacco, not Thomas Simon, which first comes to mind."

BRITAIN GOES DECIMAL

On 15th February 1971 Great Britain's currency goes decimal. But already they have begun to make the change. Two coins --- five and ten "new penny" pieces equivalent to an old shilling and florin respectively came into use 23rd April 1968.

All the new series will bear the crowned head of Queen Elizabeth II facing right on the obverse. This is a new bust by Mr. Christopher Ironside. The reverse designs are quite striking and show that considerable thought was given to the use of the available space.

A thistle surmounted by a crown stands as the reverse device above a large numeral "5" on the five new-pence piece. And the inscription, common to the whole series, is "NEW PENCE". To facilitate changing over, this coin is minted on the same size flange as its equivalent, the one shilling piece.

Similarly, the ten new-pence piece has the numeral "10" at the bottom of the reverse with a crowned lion as the device. It is also struck the same size as its equivalent, the florin. These reverse designs were also by Mr. Ironside.

But Britannia is to be banished from British coinage. Mr. J. H. James, Deputy Master of the Royal Mint, said: "We did rather regret we haven't got Britannia, but the lady doesn't sit very well on top of a large numeral."

Perhaps, though, it is just as well. For despite her patriotic associations, Britannia is not quite respectable. She appeared first about 120 AD on coins of Hadrian and Antoninus Pius struck to celebrate their achievements in Britain. But the first use on British coins was 1661 ---- The copper coinage of Charles II. The designer was John Roettier of Antwerp and he used as a model a certain Miss Stewart, the King's mistress. In 1663 Pepys had said that the King had "become besotted with Miss Stewart and will be with her half an hour together kissing her". Later Miss Stewart eloped to become the Duchess of Richmond. In 1895 she was replaced by a portrait of Britannia for which the model was Lady Susan Hicks-Beach, the daughter of the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

- Why do you want to see them?
1. Is it just to see the coins?
 2. Is it to find out about coins?
 3. Is it just plain curiosity?
 4. Is it to learn how to make up displays?

Most everyone handles coins daily in our modern way of living, which is necessary to the way we exist.

Many more people are becoming aware that there is more to coins than just purchasing power:

1. That some have a value that is more than face.
2. That some have a special reason for being minted.
3. Some people become more interested in coins when they learn about them. These are the type of people who become Numismatists.
4. Numismatists do not know all about coins, but are always studying and learning.

In our club we have members who collect and display coins according to their preference and I believe that if they were to become engaged in discussing their preference, each would have information which would be educational to all.

Everyone is still learning, be it from study, observation, or association and are better for it.

Let's get together, share a little, make up a display.

Displays have certain requirements if they are being put into exhibits where they will be judged for prizes and trophies. I believe that any of the members will offer advice and assistance if asked.

Everyone should be proud of their exhibits, and should seek advice and help if necessary, as we all had to when we first started.

1. Displays should tell a story, concise but complete.
2. Displays should be presented skilfully and have eye appeal.
3. Displays do not have to be valuable, but should be of the best material at hand or that is available.
4. Displays do not have to be superfluous, it can be a single coin.
5. I do not believe gaudy or brightly decorated displays would gain any points from judges.
6. I do believe that originality of setting up displays is a challenge.

I believe that EVERYONE is entitled to be challenged into presenting a display.

"THE GRUMP"

Take it or leave it...the price remains the same".... with a scowl on his face.

I bought it, and brought it back home along with many other good purchases. Sometime later a medal collector friend of mine saw it, and made me a very substantial offer...which I accepted. Since then, I often have a quiet chuckle to myself as I stand before the bourse table of a "grump" and compare his face and scowl to that of "my favourite grump" who sold me that medal many years ago.

Kingston Coin Club meets in the Hockey Hall of Fame.

(Canadian Numismatic Variety Collectors Association) is now writing a column on Numismatics for the local newspaper in Kingston, Ontario.
